Enclosed please find the City's Summary Report of Investigation for Complaints filed with HUD relative to East County Transitional Living Center ("ECTLC") in the City of El Cajon. At the request of Nelson D. Huseby and Chin Woo Choi, this special review and investigation were conducted to ensure ECTLC's compliance with HUD regulations governing the provision of CDBG funds to faith-based organizations for eligible activities, as well as to ensure fulfillment of its contractual obligations with the City.

Based on a review of the relevant federal regulations, guidelines, project documents and report of on-site investigation, it is the City's conclusion that ECTLC has, at all times, conducted its CDBG-funded projects and activities in compliance with federal regulations and guidelines governing the provision of CDBG funds to faith-based organizations. The City finds that ECTLC has acted diligently to comply with applicable Federal requirements, has met its contract objectives, and its projects and activities have progressed on schedule. As a result, there are no findings or concerns at this time.

<u>Summary Report of Investigation for Complaints filed with HUD relative to East</u> <u>County Transitional Living Center in the City of El Cajon</u>

(Subrecipient Special Monitoring Report)

Agency: East County Transitional Living Center (ECTLC)

Program/Project: FY 2014-15 "Emergency Shelter Program" (C0737); FY 2014-15 "Solar Panel

<u>Areas Covered</u>: This was an investigative site visit in response to recent complaints of citizens to HUD Program offices. Complaints were forwarded to the City from the City's HUD Representative on 3/10/15 (copies attached). Issues included:

- ECTLC proselytizes to clients while at the same time receiving federal funds;
- The provision of federal funds to ECTLC is a violation of the "U.S. Constitution establishment clause," and the "California State constitution non-preferential treatment" clause;
- The complainants are "against using that [CDBG] money for a solar panel system when that will benefit the facility..."; and
- Funds are being distributed by the City "unlawfully."

This report encompasses a special interim monitoring to address only the following:

- Confirmation that the programs proposing and/or using CDBG funds exist;
- Confirmation that the programs proposing and/or using CDBG funds are secular; and
- Confirmation of where CDBG funds are being spent.

Overview:

In FY 2014-15, the Emergency Shelter program with this agency is being funded with CDBG funds in the amount of \$75,000. The Emergency Shelter program provides safe, clean, and comfortable housing for families who would otherwise live on the streets of El Cajon.

In addition, an allocation of \$60,000 was awarded to ECTLC for a "solar panel project." The solar panel project was originally proposed to be built over a children's playground area in the center of the complex. The playground serves the families receiving assistance through ECTLC's Emergency Shelter program. A solid cover would provide shade for children playing in the hot

sun and the solar panels would provide energy efficiency and reduced utility costs for the agency.

However, in the process of getting bids for the solar project, the agency was advised that the two-story building located in that complex was better suited to support a full solar panel system (electrical panels and other critical connections already exist in the building, but not near the playground). Thereafter, ECTLC staff advised the Housing Division that it would be requesting additional CDBG funds to do a larger solar panel system than previously requested. ECTLC indicated that it would seek to combine the two funding allocations to complete the larger project. Staff determined that this constituted a major change in the scope of the FY 2014/15 project, and the agreement was held pending a final determination of any new allocation amount.

A tentative new allocation of \$60,000 was made to ECTLC by the City Council on 2/24/15 with the intent to combine the funds with the prior year allocation of \$60,000 to enable ECTLC to complete a larger solar panel system. Prior to the final allocations for FY 2015/16 being made at the second public hearing (scheduled for 4/28/15), the above complaints were filed.

ECTLC Programs offered on-site:

The following information is taken from discussions and documents provided by ECTLC staff, program brochures and ECTLC's website, regarding the four (4) programs in progress at the ECTLC facility:

Emergency Shelter Housing

ECTLC provides emergency shelter to homeless individuals and families regardless of their culture, ethnicity and/or faith. Participants also receive 3 meals per day and have access to case management and educational services. Shelter participants also have access to, but are not required to attend, ECTLC's religious education classes. Participants are allowed to stay up to 28 nights and pay no fees for this housing or the services. CDBG funding for operational support is provided for this program.

Transitional Living

ECTLC provides temporary affordable transitional living and services on the site. Participants are allowed to stay up to 28 days at a time (they have the ability to stay up to 12 months but must check out for 24 hours every 28 days). Families/individuals pay approximately \$199.65 per week while looking for permanent accommodations. Participants also receive 3 meals per day and have access to case management and educational services. Participants also have access to, but are not required to attend, ECTLC's religious education classes. CDBG funding is not used to provide operational support to this program.

Family Restoration Program

ECTLC provides this program for single- and two-parent families broken apart by various issues including drugs, alcohol, job loss, etc. The goal of the program is to mend the family and

restore relationships. This program is a discipleship program and requires attendance at religious education classes. CDBG funding is not used to provide operational support to this program.

Men's and Women's Discipleship Programs

ECTLC provides this program on-site for men and women who are committed to a life free from homelessness and addiction. The first 90 days of the program are located off-site on a "ranch" facility. Men and women who graduate the 90 day program are eligible to return to the facility to complete their program. This program is Christian-centric and requires attendance at religious education classes, among other things. CDBG funding is not used to provide operational support to this program.

Various CDBG Capital Projects

Since 2011/12, CDBG funds have been sought and awarded for the following capital projects at the ECTLC facility:

FY 2011-12	ECTLC	\$30,000 (heat/air units)
FY 2012-13	ECTLC	\$30,000 (heat/air units)
FY 2013-14	ECTLC	\$60,000 (parking lot)
FY 2014-15	ECTLC	\$60,000 (solar panel #1)
FY 2015-16	ECTLC	Tentative award: \$60,000 (solar panel #2)

Because all programs co-located in this facility serve the homeless in various stages of recovery, these projects were determined by staff to be eligible for CDBG funding (even though the projects may benefit the entire facility) because no religious education services take place in the buildings being used for shelter or housing. These projects were/will be provided with funds for purchase of materials and/or construction of the improvements under the Capital category of CDBG funding.

Documents and brochures reviewed relative to Site Visit:

The following documents were requested at the time of the 3/24/15 site visit:

- Occupancy lists of all Emergency Shelter clients receiving services on randomly chosen days during the fiscal year
- Copy of any "Program Rules" provided to Emergency Shelter Clients at time of service

ECTLC staff produced occupancy lists of shelter and transitional living clients receiving services on various days which staff cross-checked against invoices of the same date. ECTLC staff also confirmed that there are 3 levels of staff oversight to ensure that clients are fully screened, appropriate data is collected, and that clients are placed into the right program and billings are accurate. In addition, data for every client receiving services in the shelter and transitional

living programs is now input into the county-wide Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) which tracks duplicate entries carefully.

City staff also asked questions and requested written proof of ECTLC's verbal statements that no religious services are required in the shelter program. ECTLC provided two different brochures which clearly show that the Emergency Shelter program is secular and that participants are not required to attend any of the Christian-centric classes or studies offered. Copies of the two brochures are attached. Copies of Intake forms and program rules for shelter participants also showed no evidence that attendance at religious services is required of those participants (copies attached).

Staff reviewed ECTLC's website thoroughly. Under a description of the Emergency Housing program page, it states "This is not a Christ centered program, and families are not required to attend Bible studies and classes, although it can certainly be beneficial and is not discouraged." A copy of the relevant webpages is attached.

Finally, invoices submitted monthly by Set Free/ECTLC and reviewed by staff provide confirmation that CDBG funds are used to pay for emergency shelter clients only.

Results of Physical Inspection of Two-story Building:

ECTLC staff produced a diagram of all the units in the facility complex which distinguishes which units are available for which of the programs offered to the residents (copy attached). The units reserved for shelter programs are located nearest the front of the complex for easier supervision and are easily identifiable. On the day of the inspection, City staff attempted to knock on a few doors to confirm which program participants were in and to ask additional questions, however, all units were empty since it was during a meal hour. Staff was able to meet with and interview three shelter clients a short time later during an inspection of the meal-hall/education center in the "restaurant" facility next door to confirm they were receiving services and to ask additional questions. From the exterior, the buildings appear to be well-kept.

Results of Physical Inspection of off-site "Restaurant" facility:

The City monitor was able to physically inspect a portion of the interior of "restaurant" building next door to the shelter facility. The facility contains a kitchen and a main room filled with tables and chairs in the back (nearest the kitchen) and chairs set up facing a stage in the front. The stage is the central focus of the room. The stage contained musical gear and a microphone.

While the meal was in session, ECTLC staff identified a few shelter participants and asked if they would speak with City staff. ECTLC staff then moved away from the conversation. Results of the interviews are reported below.

Interviews with Shelter Participants:

Three shelter clients were invited to speak with City staff (out of earshot of ECTLC staff) and provided responses as follows:

Participant 1:

- Name of client: Jonathon
- Length of stay in shelter: 2 days
- Are you offered religious services in conjunction with shelter services? Yes
- Are you required to attend religious services in conjunction with shelter services? No.
 Attends by choice.
- If offered, do you know where religious education and services are conducted? Religious services are conducted in the restaurant facility.
- Have you ever seen religious classes or discussions take place in the other (housing) facility: No.

Participant 2:

- Name of client: John & Nancy
- Length of stay in shelter: 11 days
- Are you offered religious services in conjunction with shelter services? **Yes**
- Are you required to attend religious services in conjunction with shelter services? No.
- If offered, do you know where religious education and services are conducted? Religious services are conducted in the restaurant facility.
- Have you ever seen religious classes or discussions take place in the other (housing) facility: No.

Participant 3:

- Name of client: Lavada
- Length of stay in shelter: Not sure less than a week
- Are you offered religious services in conjunction with shelter services? **Yes**
- Are you required to attend religious services in conjunction with shelter services? No.
 Attends by choice.
- If offered, do you know where religious education and services are conducted? Religious services are conducted in the restaurant facility.
- Have you ever seen religious classes or discussions take place in the other (housing) facility: **No.**

All interviews were voluntary and participants were open and friendly. All participants interviewed were impressed with and grateful for the services offered by ECTLC. From the perspective of the City's staff, this is the most conclusive proof that religious proselytization is not occurring for shelter participants.

Findings and Concerns

A finding is defined as a program element that does not comply with a Federal statute or regulation. Findings require a response and must be resolved by implementing specific corrective actions.

A concern is either a potential finding or program weakness that should be improved to avoid future problems. Concerns bring to the attention of the recipient potential areas where changes could be beneficial to the program, and/or if not addressed could lead to findings in future program reviews.

No Findings or Concerns were noted.

As a subrecipient of CDBG funds from the City, Set Free/ECTLC is aware of its responsibility for all of the same rules and regulations as the City, including the duty to operate its program in accordance with federal regulations. The City believes that ECTLC takes its role as a subrecipient very seriously and endeavors to follow the federal regulations carefully in order to avoid jeopardizing federal funding. Whenever staff visits the ECTLC facility, members of the ECTLC staff have always been forthright and transparent in providing any documentation requested, answering questions, and providing tours of the facilities. Housing Division staff is given free access to the program files and units, and has never been denied access to any part of the property when requested.

Overall, the City is satisfied that the subrecipient is fulfilling its contract requirements with the City of El Cajon, that no religious proselytization is occurring with emergency shelter participants, and that no religious services or education are not required and are not occurring in the facility actually housing the shelter. It is the City's determination that no corrective actions or additional training are needed at this time.

They have also been allocated funds in past years, some of which has not been transferred yet. We believe they are in violation and all monies should be withheld.

Although we are happy to see homeless individuals given a helping hand, we are concerned because the stated primary purpose of the ECTLC is to promote Christianity.

On the front page of their website at this address: http://www.ectlc.org/newsite/ We read:

"ECTLC is a 501(c)(3) corporation with the specific purpose of leading men, women, and families to a saving faith in Christ."

We have interviewed people who have taken up residence there and they tell us proselytizing is rampant.

We notice in their recent 990 disclosures that they also support a church on the site, called the Christian Fellowship of El Cajon (http://CFOEC.org) You will notice if you google these, they use the same telephone number. Also, there was at least 33,000 of money transferred from the ECTLC to CFOEC in recent years. The residents of the ECTLC can opt out of attending church services but they have to pay more if they do.

We believe the use of the block grant monies to support the ECTLC and the CFOEC, both of which claim to have as their primary purpose, a religious purpose, is in violation of the U.S. Constitution establishment clause, and the CA State constitution nonpreferential treatment clause. We believe this money can be spent better elsewhere as there were many deserving groups asking for money at the recent city council meeting.

We are also against using that money for a solar panel system when that will benefit the facility, including the adjacent church sanctuary.

You can consider this a formal objection to the support of these religious organizations with HUD monies.

Please let us know if there is anything further we must do to make a formal objection and to make sure government money is not used to support a specific religion.

Please feel free to contact us if you need any further information.






East County Transitional Living Center

ECTLC is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit corporation with the specific purpose of leading men, women, and families to a saving faith in Christ. This includes, but not exclusively, those who are homeless, nearly homeless, and affected by drugs, alcohol, and other issues. To accomplish this goal we operate several transitional living centers in San Diego's east county, with our main campus in El Cajon. There are five (5) separate programs offered to meet the needs of the homeless, whether they are single men or women, or families fallen on hard times.

Our Discipleship Training Programs are Christ-centered, and are designed to bring individuals & families from hopelessness to faith in Christ; no longer homeless, but employed and transitioned to self-sufficiency as productive members of our communities.

Our Emergency Shelter and Transitional Living programs are secular in nature, and work with local social service providers to find permanent low-income housing and long-term programs for those seeking help. The families and individuals participating in these programs are not required to attend any of the Christ-centered classes or studies, but they are welcome to if they choose. These classes include Bible studies, GED preparation, anger management, parenting, substance abuse recovery, and other life skills curriculum.

Our mission is to provide transitional living centers that meet the needs of all homeless persons through both long and short-term case-managed programs. ECTLC maintains clean, safe facilities that provide individuals and families with temporary housing until they can regain control of their lives.


Much the same as the men's program, the Women's Discipleship Training Program offers women the opportunity to turn their shattered lives around through the teachings of Jesus Christ.

They will remain there for 90 days as they heal and connect with the other women, separated from their old neighborhoods and acquaintances, tossing off the baggage that accompanies homelessness, addiction, and unhealthy relationships.

When they graduate to the main campus in El Cajon, they will utilize the remainder of the year-long program to learn the life skills needed to return to the community. The transformations made in their lives will have a lasting beneficial impact, not only on their children, family, and friends, but on society as a whole. They will be living the abundant life in Christ.





Transitional Living Program

Due to the economy, many people in our communities who still work or have fixed incomes have lost their residences. Some were renters who found themselves on the streets when foreclosures went through. Others cannot keep up with the rising costs of living and find themselves living in their cars or in expensive weekly motels.

We offer temporary but affordable housing that includes opportunities for meals and social services at no additional cost. We are able to house these individuals and families for up to 28 days at a time, enabling them to save their money and find affordable, long-term housing. Our case-managers are aware of all the opportunities and benefits available to these clients, to help them into more suitable situations.




The goal of the program is to help them find permanent, long-term housing in their community. This resource helps many of our homeless families that might otherwise fall through the cracks in our social service system, simply because they are unaware of the resources available to them.




Emergency Housing

We see them on the streets and in business doorways perhaps just outside of your home or place of business. The homeless have lost their way in life and do not have the resources to find their way back to wholeness. This program is funded primarily through HUD Community Development Block Grants in the City of El Cajon. It allows us to assist both individuals and families who are homeless in the El Cajon area.

The goal is to place participants into long-term programs which will move them from homelessness to productivity in our communities. They may choose one of our programs here at ECTLC, if they qualify, but we cannot help everyone (mental illness, physical disabilities, highly medicated, etc). If this is the case our case managers will help these individuals & families find a program better suited to their needs.

We are looking for partners to assist financially with this program, as the grant monies do not fully meet the needs of our community and are limited to El Cajon. All donations to this and the rest of the programs at ECTLC are tax deductible, and together we can make a difference in our communities.

Visitation Policies and Procedures Form

Because of the diversity of circumstances surrounding the need for obtaining the ECTLC services, there is a strict visitation policy that must be adhered to for the purpose of maintaining a safe and crime free environment. All non-program members must follow the proper protocol when visiting ECTLC Program Participants.

 ECTLC Program Participants must submit a visitor request form for Staff approval in writing prior to any non-program member visitation.
Upon approval by ECTLC Staff, the non-program member will be added to an approved visitor's list. Visitors who are not on approved list are not eligible for visitation
 Visiting non-program members will check with the front office receptionist, verify that they are on the approved list, produce a photo ID for verification and allow receptionist to contact ECTLC Program member via contact number on file.
 Program member will then come to reception area and enter visitor information in the visitation log. This will include date, legible name, room number visited and time in
 Visitations can be conducted in playground area, pool area, or in church parking lot adjacent to ECTLC facility.
 Non-program members are not allowed in program member's room, under any circumstances
 All visitors must park their vehicles in church parking lot next door. Parking spaces on ECTLC property are reserved for Program Members Only
 All visitors must adhere to ECTLC Policies concerning loud or abusive language, smoking on property, and being under the influence.

Our Vision:

To provide hope and a hand-up to homeless and other individuals/families in need, by assisting them into independent, self-sustained living through case-managed transitional programs provided by ECTLC: a 501(c)(3) non-profit corporation with the specific purpose of leading men, women, and families to a saving faith in Christ. This includes, but not exclusively, those who are homeless, nearly homeless, and those who are affected by drugs, alcohol, and other issues including aged-out foster children, unplanned pregnancies etc...

ECTLC provides emergency housing, transitional housing, job skills development, biblical training, opportunities to earn a GED, case management, and linkage to important resources which enable participants to become self -sustaining members of our community.

ECTLC provides this hand up approach to individuals who are ready to take responsibility for their lives, and leave behind negative relationships, criminal behavior, substance abuse and other choices which have led them to chronic homelessness, broken lives and broken families.

ECTLC services are available to all men, women and their minor children regardless of their culture, ethnicity and/or faith. Attendance at religious services is not a requirement of receiving services in all of our programs. ECTLC's Discipleship programs are available to men, women and families who choose to attend biblical studies, and life skill classes over a period of one year. The goal of these programs, and all of the services at ECTLC, is to provide a safe, nurturing environment where individuals and families can receive a hand up in regaining their lives, and return to our communities as productive members.

OurValues:

Founded upon the Word of God, we value each individual as precious, and we commit to treat each person as priceless. Love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, gentleness, faith, meekness, and self-control are the core of our teachings.

Emergency Housing

We see them on the streets and in business doorways - perhaps just outside of your home or place of business. The homeless have lost their way in life and do not have the resources to find their way back to wholeness. This program is funded primarily through HUD Community Development Block Grants in the City of El Cajon. It allows us to assist both individuals and families who are homeless in the El Cajon area.

The goal is to place participants into long-term programs which will move them from homelessness to productivity in our communities. They may choose one of our programs here at ECTLC, if they qualify, but we cannot help everyone (mental illness, physical disabilities, highly medicated, etc). If this is the case our case managers will help these individuals & families find a program better suited to their needs. This is not a Christ centered program, and families are not required to attend Bible studies and classes, although it can certainly be beneficial and is not discouraged.

We are looking for partners to assist financially with this program, as the grant monies do not fully meet the needs of our community and are limited to El Cajon. All donations to this and the rest of the programs at ECTLC are tax deductible, and together we can make a difference in our communities.

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Transitional Living

Due to the economy, many people in our communities who still work or have fixed incomes have lost their residences. Some were renters who found themselves on the streets when foreclosures went through. Others cannot keep up with the rising costs of living and find themselves living in their cars or in expensive weekly motels.

We offer temporary but affordable housing that includes opportunities for meals and social services at no additional cost. We are able to house these individuals and families for up to 28 days at a time, enabling them to save their money and find affordable, long-term housing. Our case-managers are aware of all the opportunities and benefits available to these clients, to help them into more suitable situations. This Transitional Living program is secular, and does not require participation in Bible studies or other classes.
